RECENT WPA INTELLIGENCE POLL SHOWS COLORADO VOTERS OVERWHELMINGLY OPPOSE

REMOVING THE LABOR PEACE ACT SECOND VOTE.

DATE: JANUARY 12, 2025

A new poll by WPA Intelligence in Colorado, conducted January 6-8, 2025, shows that seventy percent of voters oppose removing the Labor Peace Act second vote.

When we ask Colorado voters whether they supported or opposed removing the second Labor Peace Act vote, seven-in-ten say they oppose the change.

We read voters a brief description of the current system and proposed change to the Labor Peace Act:

Like all states, Colorado workers are allowed to form a labor union if fifty percent of the workers plus one in a company vote to do so.

But in Colorado a second vote of seventy-five percent of workers is required if the labor union wants to INCLUDE A REQUIREMENT THAT ALL workers, whether they want to or not, to pay dues or fees from their paycheck as a condition of their continued employment.

The Colorado legislature is considering eliminating that second vote and to allow a labor union to

deduct membership fees or dues from every employee's paycheck after just the first election of fifty percent plus one.

Based on what you know today, would you support or oppose this change to Colorado labor law?

Seven-in-ten (70%) Colorado voters say they would oppose the change and just 25% say they would support it.

- Another five percent say they are not sure.
- Nearly half (46%) of voters say they strongly oppose this change.



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Super-majorities of both Republicans and Independents oppose removing the second vote and they are joined by half of Democrats.

- Nearly nine-in-ten (87%) Republicans oppose removing the second vote.
- Opposition is nearly as high among Independents with 72% in opposition.
- Half of Democratic voters oppose the change.

Every age cohort opposes removing the second vote.

- Two-thirds (66%) of 18–34-year-olds oppose the change.
- Seven-in-ten (70%) of those 35-64 who are further along in their careers oppose the change.
- Opposition is highest among those age of those over 65 with 72% in opposition.

Colorado voters oppose requiring works to have labor union dues deducted from their paycheck whether they belong to the union in their workplace or not.

- Two-thirds (67%) oppose mandatory paycheck deductions of labor union dues.
- Just 27% support it and five percent aren't sure.

This widespread opposition to removing the second vote comes despite Colorado voters having generally favorable views of labor unions. Voters aren't anti-labor union, but they are against mandatory labor union dues.

- Nearly two-thirds of Colorado voters have favorable opinions of labor union.
- Just 28% say they have unfavorable opinions and another eight percent aren't sure.

Methodology

WPAi conducted a poll of n = 507 voters in Colorado. Data was collected January 6-8, 2025, by live telephone interview. Sixty-five percent (65%) of interviews were conducted to cell phones and 35% to landline phones. The sample was selected from the Colorado voter file and was stratified by geography, age, gender, educational attainment, party registration and ethnicity. The survey has a margin of error of $\pm 4.4\%$ at the 95% confidence level.
