

Insights & Analysis

- The top issues for the city government clearly revolve around homelessness *then* public safety. While public safety tops the top issues, the **intensity behind homelessness** in the rest of the survey is stronger. These issues, especially homelessness, can be tied to the issue of **housing availability** (23% top issue), especially among left-leaning voters. See verbatim slides 16 & 24.
 - 35% of Denver voters feel unsafe downtown, and 74% say crime is a major problem or even crisis. The issue of homelessness is even more dire. 96% of Denver voters say homelessness is a major problem, with nearly half of those residents labeling it a "crisis."
- Voters do not think Denver is doing enough to solve these issues. 32% give Denver's efforts to reduce homelessness an "F," and 26% give the same failing grade to its efforts on crime.
- Two-thirds of voters support increasing the Denver Police Department's budget, especially voters 50+ and perfect (4/4) voters. Even 63% of Democrats would support a budget increase.
 Defunding the police is opposed by 50% of voters, including a plurality of Democrats and non-white voters.
 - Eliminating police unions is opposed by a plurality of voters (32% support / 37% oppose) but
 most don't have a strong opinion on the topic. Voters 50+ and Republicans are most opposed
 while Democrats and UAFs are split. 86% of voters support banning officers with
 multiple violations, including two-thirds of Republicans.
- Outgoing Mayor Michael Hancock's image (-22 net fav) is very unfavorable, while Jared Polis is broadly popular at +53 net favorability. The Denver Police Department (+2 net fav) sees the strongest support from seniors, Southeast residents, UAFs, and homeowners. The Denver City Council is unpopular at -7 net favorability.
- The race for mayor is wide open. Kelly Brough leads with just under 8% of the vote while seeing some bipartisan appeal. However, 60% of voters remain undecided. Mike Johnston narrowly leads the second-choice ballot.




Polis' image is very positive and even almost a quarter of Republicans hold a favorable view






Hancock is underwater even among Democrats; least favorable among voters 50+, UAFs, and in the Southeast






Majority of UAFs and homeowners view DPD favorably with strong backing from seniors; net unfavorable outside SE geo








Denver City Council is broadly unpopular particularly among men 50+, UAFs, and homeowners








Crime and homelessness are top priority for over half of likely voters; GOP, UAFS, and men 50+ emphasize crime











"More must be done to keep homeless who have addiction and mental illness off the streets so that the people who live in the city are safe." – woman 65+, somewhat liberal Democrat

"Homelessness is dominating Denver and will impede any other initiative, such as parks and recs, economic development, small business growth, etc. It cannot be allowed to continue in such high concentrations in the downtown and surrounding core." - woman 35-49, somewhat liberal Democrat

"The politicians aren't doing nearly enough to resolve the problem. it's become dangerous for families to go downtown. I want a humane response, but the city needs to do something." – woman 50-64, very liberal Democrat








UAFs support broadly popular proposal to treat people suffering addiction using taxpayer funding














Crime is not as much a "crisis" as issue of homelessness but still major problem among diverse majority of voters







Plurality of likely voters give Denver a "C" on crime, grading its efforts more favorably than on homelessness








Eliminating police unions is divisive among Democrats and UAFs but solidly opposed by GOP, voters 50-64, and seniors







Two-thirds of likely voters support increasing DPD's budget, especially voters 50+ and a majority of Democrats





